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## ATTORNEY GENERAL

### ADMINISTRATIVE HISTORY

The Attorney General of the State of Hawaii, head of the department of the same name, administers state legal services, to include furnishing legal opinions to the Governor, legislature and state executive departments, and represents the state in legal actions to which it is a party.

The first Attorney General, John Ricord (1812-1861), was appointed by Kamehameha III on March 9, 1844, although the office itself was not formally established until October 29, 1845 by The First Act of Kamehameha III, "An Act to Organize the Executive Ministry." Six months later on April 27, 1846, the Department of Law, was created by the Second Act of Kamehameha III, "An Act to Organize the Executive Departments," and the Attorney General was placed in charge. The Attorney General was appointed by and served at the pleasure of the King and he reported to the King and the Privy Council.

The responsibilities of the Attorney General included: (1) acknowledging deeds, releases of dower's rights, contracts and agreements, certificates of co-partnership, articles of marriage settlement, and all other instruments that required recording (ex-officio registrar of conveyances); (2) prosecuting and defending all actions before the supreme, superior, or circuit courts in which the government was a direct party; (3) appointing, controlling, and removing notaries public (ex-officio principal notary public); (4) advising and counseling the King and the executive ministers on matters of law or legal policy; and (5) presenting all crimes, misdemeanors, and public torts by indictment.

John Ricord resigned his office in May, 1847 and the Legislative council passed a Joint Resolution that suspended the office of Attorney General "until the new appointment of such an officer." However, at this time, the Minister of the Interior succeeded to the rights, powers, and duties of the Attorney General as head of the Bureau of Executive Judicial Officers and the Executive Extra-Judicial Officers. The various responsibilities of the Attorney General were distributed to other government officials. For example, the King appointed a registrar of conveyances to serve as principal notary public for the Kingdom; the governors of Maui, Kauai, and Hawaii selected their own notaries public; and the superior court judges appointed a district attorney for each island district to try civil and criminal cases on behalf of the government.

For fifteen years, the office of attorney general remained vacant. On August 22, 1862, the Legislative Council passed an act providing that the King "may" appoint an attorney general (Session Laws 1862). This act restored to the office the responsibilities previously delegated to other officials and, in addition, charged him: (1) to help the poor and oppressed subjects obtain their rights, without charge; (2) to attend regular terms of the Courts of Record in each judicial district; and (3) to prosecute anyone committing trespass or waste on any portion of public domain or property, e.g. obstructing harbors, streams, and highways. Charles C. Harris was appointed the Attorney General on August 26, 1862.

The Constitution granted by Kamehameha V on August 20, 1864 made the appointment of an attorney general compulsory and included him in the King's cabinet as well as an ex-officio member of the Privy Council of State.

With the overthrow of Queen Liliuokalani in 1893, and the subsequent reorganization of the government as a republic, a new constitution provided that the attorney general be included in the Executive cabinet and be appointed by the President of the Republic. The Attorney General appeared for the government personally or by deputy in all criminal and civil cases in which the government was a part; advised and counseled public officers in matters connected with their public duties; aided and counseled "poor and oppressed" citizens to help them obtain their rights; gave opinions upon questions of law submitted by the president, Legislative Assembly, or the head of any department; and controlled and supervised the internal police and the care and custody of prisoners (Civil Laws 1897).

Following annexation of Hawaii to the United States in 1900, the Organic Act empowered the territorial governor to nominate and appoint the Attorney General, with the advice and consent of the territorial Senate. In addition to the established responsibilities of the office, the Attorney General was delegated the powers and duties of the Minister of the Interior relating to prisons, prisoners, prison inspectors, notaries public, and escheat of lands.

Throughout the 1900's the duties of this department remained basically the same. However, additional functions were added periodically, such as: drafting bills to present to the Legislature; performing requested services for the Delegate to Congress; and supervising the Bureau of Crime Statistics and Identification (Act 246, S.L.H. 1947).

Pursuant to the Hawaii State Government Reorganization Act of 1959 (Second Special Session of 1959) the Department of the Attorney General was restructured to include the Commission to Promote Uniform Legislation and the Commission on Subversive Activities. The Attorney General was further designated the Consumer Counsel for the State to investigate reported or suspected violations of the law.

### SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The records of the Department of the Attorney General date from 1844 to 1982 and total 126.53 cubic/linear feet. They include correspondence, opinions, memoranda, notes, telegrams, commissions, oaths of office, bills, receipts, maps, drawings, newspaper clipping and articles, financial records and scrapbooks. Many of the older records are fragile.

The records provide a legal perspective on topics such as land and water rights, post-war planning, labor relations and statehood. They provide insights into the interactions of government agencies in formulating and implementing policies dealing with those topics, as well as information on specific issues such as whether territorial tax laws apply on federal property, and whether the Board of Commissioners of Agriculture and Forestry may grant leases to public lands. Also significant are the recommendations to the Governor on legislative matters and details of the Insurrection of 1895. The collection provides a unique and valuable perspective on the history of Hawaii over nearly a century and a half. In addition, it complements and sometimes provides more detailed information than is available in the archived records of other government agencies such as the Departments of Civil Service/Human Resources or Public Instruction/Education

Most of this record group was re-processed because access was difficult. The most important decision taken during re-processing was to create a single, unified arrangement for each series. The records have been arranged into nine series: Letterbooks, 1874-1918 (Series 508); Territorial Correspondence, 1900-1958 (Series 509); Correspondence, 1959-1982 (Series 503); General Records, 1844-1899 (Series 505), which includes incoming letters; Opinions, 1892-1918 (Series 510); Records of Cases, 1873-1940 (Series 507); Insurrection of 1895 (Series 506); Financial Records, 1868-1905 (Series 511); and Records of Daily Activities, 1905-1907 (Series 512).

**Series Number:** 508      **Series Title:** Letterbooks

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**Date Range:** 1874-1918.

**Quantity:** 6.98 linear feet in 53 volumes including 5 typescript copies.

**Creator:** Department of the Attorney General.

**Physical Characteristics/Condition:** The volumes are legal-size leatherbound letterpress copy books with indices, in poor to fair condition. The ink in some of the volumes has blurred to the point of illegibility. The copies, which apparently date from the 1930's and were New Deal WPA projects, are in excellent condition.

**Content Description:** Contains the outgoing letters of the office of the Attorney General. Letters include advice on various aspects of the law, coroner's inquests, charges against individuals, prison management and requests for pardon. Also included are routine letters such as acknowledgments of receipt and transmittals of checks, bonds, leases, and other documents. The letters, signed by the Attorney General, Deputy Attorneys General, and clerks, are indexed by addressee at the front of each volume. Addressees include government officials such as the Governor, Commissioner of Public Lands, President of the Board of Health, Minister of the Interior, Marshal of the Kingdom, island governors and island sheriffs, tax assessors, circuit court judges, district magistrates, as well as private citizens.

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**Date Range:** 1900-1958.

**Quantity:** 69.08 cubic feet in 70 cubic foot boxes and seven folders of separated oversize material.

**Creator:** Department of the Attorney General.

**Physical Characteristics/Condition:** Manuscript and typescript paper records, including blueprints, pamphlets and newspaper clippings in fair to good condition. Thermofax materials have been replaced with xerographic copies. Includes a few black and white photographs. Some early records have significant insect damage or embrittlement. Some oversize records have been separated.

**Content Description:** Contains mostly correspondence, including cablegrams and radiograms, the bulk with the Governor and territorial agencies. The remainder is with the four counties, U.S. federal agencies, foreign consuls and private organizations and individuals. Notes of deputy attorneys general dealing with the issue at hand are included with some of the correspondence. Also contains other record types, such as commissions of deputy attorneys general and notaries public; survey notes and maps; deeds and leases; contracts and bonds; organization charts; petitions; statements and affidavits; court calendars and filings, such as complaints and answers; reports of grand juries, coroner's inquests and police investigations; copies of Governor's quasi-judicial actions such as paroles and pardons; legislative documents, such as bills and resolutions; and a few blank forms.

The records deal with a variety of subjects and includes requests for legal opinions; appeals for redress of grievances and from unfavorable administrative actions; complaints about the conduct of lawyers and district magistrates; coordination of investigations and prosecutions with county attorneys; demands for payment of lease rent or other fees due to government agencies; monitoring of content of non-English language newspapers; requests for parole or pardon (filed under Attorney General, Internal and General Public, Governor, Prison Directors/Inspectors, Board of Paroles and Pardons or Department of Institutions); sales of public lands; and water rights cases (filed under Public Lands). Some of the correspondence deals with routine matters such as schedules of hearings; invoices for goods and services, including court reporters'; payrolls; receipts for cash or records; rosters of employees; and letters of acknowledgment and transmittal. Some records are in Hawaiian; a few are in other languages such as Chinese, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Spanish or Tagalog. Some have been translated, none by the Archives staff.

**Series Number:** 509

**Series Title:** Territorial Correspondence of the Attorney General

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**Arrangement:** Chronological by year and thereunder alphabetical by agency or, occasionally, by subject. Within files, arrangement is chronological by date, except under Legislature, reports on bills and joint resolutions are filed numerically.

**Note on filing:** The filing scheme varies with time, because organizational relations and names varied with time. In most cases, correspondence with an agency is filed under that agency's name, as it was at the time. For example: correspondence with Waimano Home prior to 1923 is filed under Feeble Minded, Board of Commissioners for the Home for. In a few cases, correspondence with an agency is filed under the department of which the agency was a part. For example: correspondence with the Territorial Hospital is filed under Health, Board of, into 1939, and under Institutions, Department of from 1939 until 1958. Correspondence dealing with the Kalaupapa settlement is filed under Health, Board of, through 1931, and thereafter under Hospitals and Settlement, Board of.

**Access:** Some items are restricted under HRS §92F (right to privacy). The restrictions, and the dates they are lifted, are indicated on the container list. Otherwise, access is unrestricted.

**Other Resources:** The records of many, but not all, of the agencies with which the Attorney General corresponded, such as each Governor, the Department of Institutions and the Farm Loan Board, are also in the Archives.

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**Date Range:** 1959-1982.

**Quantity:** 34.04 cubic feet in 54 7.5-inch boxes and one 5-inch box.

**Creator:** Department of the Attorney General.

**Physical Characteristics/Condition:** Note-pad, letter-, legal-, and folded oversize original, carbon and xerox copy, mimeograph, stencil, lithograph, newsprint, blueprint and diazo typescript and graphic paper records in fair to good condition. Some materials include handwritten annotations. Thermofax materials have been replaced with xerographic copies. Includes a few black and white photographs. Some records have been repaired or reinforced with, and stained by, cellophane tape.

**Content Description:** Contains correspondence of the Attorney General and Deputy Attorneys General with the Governor, heads of executive departments, boards, commissions, members of the judiciary, legislature and county governments, officials of the federal government, other states and foreign countries, law firms, contractors, public advocacy groups and private individuals. Also contains internal notes and memoranda; court documents (complaints, summons, etc.); reports to the Governor on legislative bills passed; reports of investigations conducted by the Attorney General; copies of agendas and minutes of meetings, of various groups, at which a representative of the Attorney General was in attendance; records of hearings, decisions and orders of various regulatory boards and commissions; letters of appointment and resignation; lists of assignments; copies of contracts entered into by government agencies; opinions in response to requests from various government officials; maps; printed forms, brochures, and other published material; newspaper clippings and press releases; postcards, radiograms and telegrams; tabulated data receipts; administrative rules and regulations; and routing slips. The records almost always address legal issues arising from specific aspects of diverse subjects, such as: reviewing and approving contracts and administrative rules; invoking sovereign immunity in defense of actions against the state; defending tort claims against government agencies and public employees alleging state culpability for injuries alleged suffered from a variety of causes, such as asbestos in schools, heptachlor in milk or defects in road design; computing working hours of school cafeteria employees; requiring students to work in school cafeterias; leasing Hawaiian Home Lands and other conveying of real property; computing school principals' salaries; accounting for funds; and writing off bad debts.

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**Arrangement:** Chronological by calendar year, thereunder alphabetical by file folder title. Within files, arrangement is usually chronological by date of a completed action, although some folders contain numbered items, such as legislative measures, which are arranged in numerical order.

**Notes:**

1. 19<sup>th</sup> Century correspondence is in Series 506, General Records and Series 508, Letterbooks. Correspondence dated 1900-1958 is in Series 509, Territorial Correspondence.
2. Items in folders are rarely in exact chronological order, and often include items of earlier date than the folder date. For example, a request for an opinion is normally filed following the opinion itself, rather than in chronological order, preceding the opinion. In addition, such requests, or their enclosures, are sometimes dated in years prior to the date of the folder. For example, a 1960 Department of Health request for an opinion, and the opinion issued in response (the "completed action"), if dated 1961, would both be filed in the 1961 Department of Health folder.
3. Letters of appointment and resignation, lists of assignments, and copies of contracts entered into by government agencies have been sampled.

**Access:** Access is unrestricted except for folders identified as restricted on the container list. Restricted material must be screened by the Reference Archivist to determine if it may be issued or must be withheld. Restrictions are removed as indicated on the container list.

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**Date Range:** 1844-1899.

**Quantity:** 3.17 cubic feet in 4 cubic foot boxes.

**Creator:** Department of the Attorney General.

**Physical Characteristics/Condition:** Note-pad, letter-, legal-, and folded oversize original and copy manuscript and typescript paper records in poor to good condition. Many records have been removed from scrapbooks, and scrapbook remnants remain glued to the edges of the documents. Some records are torn, stained or embrittled from acidification.

**Content Description:** Contains correspondence (mostly incoming letters, including telegrams) of the Attorney General, the Marshal and the island sheriffs; commissions and oaths of office of deputy attorneys general, police constables and deputy sheriffs; reports of inquests and other investigations by coroners, district magistrates, tax assessors and school agents; leases, deeds and mortgages; statements of witnesses, etc., to police; oaths and bonds sworn before police constables; maps of parcels of land; financial records, including such things as account balance sheets and cash receipts; and a wedding announcement. The records address a variety of issues, such as citizen complaints against police, pending cases, employee wages, and government policy toward royalists following the overthrow.

**Arrangement:** Chronological.

**Notes:**

1. Some records are in Hawaiian; a few are in Chinese or Japanese. Some have been translated, none by the Archives staff.
2. For additional records dealing with the Marshal and the island sheriffs, see the finding aid for the Police records group.

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**Date Range:** 1844, 1892-1918.

**Quantity:** 1.25 linear feet in 11 volumes.

**Creator:** Department of the Attorney General.

**Physical Characteristics/Condition:** One legal-size notebook with manuscript entries in poor condition. Ten legal-size leatherbound letterpress copy books with typescript copy and manuscript indices in poor to fair condition. Except for the indices, the leaves are onionskin, but not otherwise particularly fragile. The ink in some of the copy has blurred or faded to the point of illegibility in some copy book volumes.

**Content Description:** The earliest volume, dated 1844, contains comments of the Attorney General, sometimes formally titled as opinions, on such things as a complaint by the French Consul about the treatment of Catholic clergy and a letter from the Earl of Aberdeen stating the position of the British government with respect several issues, including the Charlton land claim. The later volumes contain formal opinions of the Attorney General, issued in response to requests from government officials, including legislators. Opinions are the Attorney General's interpretation of the law relative to issues raised in the requests. There are additional 19<sup>th</sup> century opinions in the general records [Series 505]. Opinions dated 1918 and later are interfiled with the correspondence [Series 503 and 509].

**Arrangement:** Generally chronological, and beginning in 1904, numerical. A few opinions are out of chronological (and numerical) order.

**Access:** Access is unrestricted.

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**Date Range:** 1856-1940.

**Quantity:** 7.13 linear/cubic feet in 4 volumes, 7 cubic foot boxes, one 5.5-inch box and one photograph album.

**Creator:** Department of the Attorney General.

**Physical Characteristics/Condition:** The volumes and papers are in poor to good condition. The photo album contains 40 8x10-inch black and white prints and is in good condition. Also included are physical evidence and published material in fair condition.

**Content Description:** Contains materials directly related to cases, but the records are not "case files." Types of cases include: appeal from tax assessment, foreclosure of mortgage, suicide, conspiracy, violation of Board of Health regulations, determination of water rights, bootlegging, murder and treason.

Volume 1 records events scheduled for court and documents received. Events include trials, hearings and filings of briefs etc., and provide the name of the case, the name of the judge, and the name of the deputy attorney general responsible. Documents received include pleas, motions, etc. Volumes 2 and 3 are records of finished cases and provide case name and number, circuit court number, type of case, records of events, and judgment. Some entries lack information on final action, although some of these are marked "pau." Volume 4 contains entries listing venue, such as First Circuit Court, Land Commission or "Consultation;" the case or issue; and actions taken.

The paper records include materials such as complaints, summons, answers, briefs, motions, pleas, and writs of various kinds, as well as correspondence, maps, survey notes, expense accounts, leases, and tabulated data on such things as water flow rates. Files are labeled by name, usually of the defendant, type of case, or jurisdiction. The materials filed by jurisdiction are usually "court-related" papers, such as calendars, summons, pleas and minutes, the bulk dated before 1885, filed chronologically. There are no by-court filings for Fifth Circuit Court, perhaps because the Fifth Circuit was not established until 1892. There are also a few files containing examples of form, such as instructions to juries, apparently prepared and maintained within the Attorney General's office to provide uniformity in preparation of briefs, pleas, etc.

The series includes the complete files, nearly three cubic feet, of case no. 4791, the "Hilo Massacre" (1938). These records consist of correspondence, lists, notes, photographs, physical

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evidence consisting of expended and unexpended ordnance, witness statements, a copy of a report to the Governor, and material related to a grand jury. The few "court" documents present relate to the Grand Jury. There is information in the files which suggests that case no. 4791 included motion picture film. However, none was in file when the records were processed. Many records, most of early date, are in Hawaiian, and a few more are in Japanese or Portuguese; they usually lack English translation.

**Arrangement:** Alphabetical by file folder title for the records filed by name, type of case, or jurisdiction, followed by the files of case no. 4791 in a second alphabetical arrangement.

**Content Description:** The bulk of the series is sworn statements and affidavits related to events of the insurrection. These records, as well as a few others such as agent reports, are numbered and indexed. Access is via the index. The remaining records include correspondence; claims against the government for damages allegedly suffered as a result of the government's response to the insurrection; lists of persons arrested, tried, and deported; petitions for pardon of political prisoners; lists of officials who did not take the oath of loyalty to the Republic; receipts for payments to government informants; a map of H. F. Bertleman's Waikiki residence; translations of articles in Hawaiian newspapers; and files related to alleged conspirators. The contents of these files appear mostly to be in-house working papers, rather than court pleadings. Often the charge is not listed, but was most likely treason or conspiracy. The files include such things as transcripts of testimony, background and trial preparatory material, and other notes.

**Arrangement:** The index, statements and affidavits in numerical order, and remaining materials in alphabetical order.

**Note:** The index to the statements and affidavits indexes both the author and the persons named in the document. The indexing is not complete.

Three have insect damage; two lack their spines, their covers are separated, and are bound with twill tape. The cash vouchers are mostly printed forms, completed by hand with pen and ink and sometimes rubber-stamped.

**Content Description:** Cash vouchers, with supporting documentation such as invoices from vendors, mostly providing detail of expenses of the prisons, but including expenses for support of citizens guards. Accounts ledgers and a journal which contain details of the fiscal administration of the Department of the Attorney General. Entries include the date, account and amount debited or credited. In the ledgers were recorded transactions by account. Examples of accounts are "Detective Service," "Expenses of Witnesses in Criminal Cases," "Incidentals," "Pay of Police, Kauai," "Physicians, Receiving Station and Prison," and "Support of Citizens' Guards." Entries include the amount appropriated to the account and amounts paid out for salary, rations, clothing, etc. Personal and business names are lacking in the journal and ledgers; company names occur throughout the vouchers.
