**JOHN REED  
(d.1858)**

A native of Wales, John Reed was proprietor of the Gravier or Western Hotel, Honolulu. He lost the use of his lower limbs about 1856. He was part-owner of the newly built 12-ton schooner, Prince of Hawaii. On August 10, 1858, in a sudden squall off the Napali cliffs between Kauai and Niihau, he and others were drowned when the ship capsized.

## HENRY BOND RESTARICK COLLECTION

## INTRODUCTION

This collection is a rather amorphous aggregation of often unrelated and incomplete material which reflects its uncertain lineage. According to available records, part of the collection (1 folder) was received in 1972 from the Restaricks' former housekeeper, Mrs. Millie Tom, who inherited the material and donated it to the Daughters of Hawaii. They in turn donated it to the Archives, except for a 1932 letter from D. C. Bryant to H. B. Restarick. Unfortunately, the records fail to indicate whence this last item was received. The records also indicate that at about this same time, a stereoscope and stereo photographs were received from Mrs. Tom via the Friends of Iolani Palace to whom she had given them, and they may also have been part of the Restarick estate. They are now part of the photograph collection. The bulk of the collection as currently constituted was received directly from Mrs. Tom in 1986, and amalgamated with the earlier accession. The collection consists of 3.5 linear inches.

## BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

- 1854 - December 26: born, Holcombe, Somerset, England, to Edwin and Amelia (Webb) Restarick; received early education at King James School, Bridgwater, Somerset.
- 1873 - Emigrated from England to North America; worked on a farm in Canada; later taught school and read law in Council Bluffs, Iowa.
- 1879 - Became naturalized U. S. citizen.
- 1882 - Graduated from Griswold College, Davenport, Iowa and ordained a priest in the Protestant Episcopal Church; June 28: married May Lottie Baker of Council Bluffs, by whom he eventually fathered three children: Constance, Margaret and Arthur; moved to California and assigned a parish encompassing all of San Diego County.
- 1902 - April: elected first American Bishop of Honolulu, following transfer of the church in Hawaii from English to American jurisdiction; August: arrived in Hawaii.
- 1903 - Received D.D. from King's College, Nova Scotia.
- 1920 - Resigned as Bishop of Honolulu because of ill health; remained active in the community as a writer and historian; by 1930, President of the Hawaiian Historical Society and President of the Library of Hawaii.
- 1928 - One of five commissioners of the sesquicentennial celebration of Captain Cook's arrival in Hawaii.
- 1933 - December 8: died in Honolulu.

## SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The Henry Bond Restarick Collection consists mostly of speeches and articles (typescript drafts and clippings of published copy), as well as some correspondence, often including background notes or other reference material dealing with topics in Hawaiian history. They reflect Restarick's interest in Hawaiian history which culminated in his participation in the sesquicentennial celebration of Captain Cook's arrival in Hawaii.

Specific topics include such things as whether or not Spaniards happened upon the Hawaiian Islands as much as 200 years before Captain Cook. Correspondence include exchanges between Bishop Restarick and others via "letters to the editor." The materials were authored, transcribed or collected by Bishop Restarick, although some materials bear no specific relation to the Bishop or any of his family. Within the historical materials a large proportion deals with Captain James Cook: his character, contributions, genealogy and importance in history. There are also some materials dealing with religious issues which may be considered contemporary (although of course their origins are rooted in the history of Christianity), as well as a few other incidental items: six letters from Kamehameha V to Dr. F. W. Hutchison; poems by May Restarick (1920-1921); an obituary issue of the "Hawaiian Church Chronicle" (1934).

Included are accounts of his death, analyses of his character, an appreciation of his contributions to science and his place in history; correspondence and notes concerning "Cook's Arrow" on Kauai; and correspondence, notes and charts dealing with his genealogy. Several of the typescripts are incomplete.

Subjects discussed include pre-Cook western contact, the applicability of the Monroe Doctrine to Hawaii, English influence in Hawaii, the smallpox epidemic of 1853 and the election of King Kalakaua. Some typescripts are incomplete.

STEPHEN REYNOLDS  
(1782-1857)

- 1782 Born on November 18 in Andover, Massachusetts.
- 1810 October, shipped as AB on brig New Hazard on trading cruise to Pacific Northwest; cruises ended December 1813. Ship was at Hawaiian Islands one month during this time.
- 1817 Summer, shipped aboard ship Ida on trip to Pacific Northwest.
- 1822 Moved to Honolulu and worked as clerk for William French until 1829.
- 1829 Married Susan Jackson; five children.  
Went into business for himself, dealing mainly in sandalwood, later became general merchant.  
Staunch supporter of Oahu Charity School and taught dancing classes there; later elected to serve on management committee on school.
- 1846 One of the first members of Masonic chapter, Lodge Le Progress de L'Oceanie. In April was named consul for Bremen in Hawaii.
- 1848 August, appointed Vice-Consul for Hamburg in Hawaii.
- 1849 December, bought half-interest in Haliimaile Plantation, East Maui; several years later became sole owner.
- 1854 In April, his Kahului store burned with a \$7,000 loss, bad debts and other causes reduced his holdings and business.
- 1855 In August, a suit in Supreme Court ended with Reynolds being declared "of unsound mind;" business placed in hands of trustees.
- 1856 In May, Reynolds was taken back to his home in Boxford, Massachusetts.
- 1857 Died July 17 in Boxford, Massachusetts.

Queen Emma died on April 24, 1884 without any surviving children. By terms of the will of her father, Dr. T. C. B. Rooke, the right to a life estate received from him passed to his nephew, C. K. C. Rooke of England. Queen Emma willed much of this estate to the Queen's Hospital, but through court action, C. K. C. Rooke's title to the estate was confirmed in 1900, thus depriving the hospital and other beneficiaries of the Queen's will of their bequests. C. K. C. Rooke died on August 17, 1903. Three-fourths of his Hawaii property was confirmed to his wife, Mary Rooke. The papers in this collection deal with the administration of C. K. C. Rooke's interest in this estate.

ROYAL HAWAIIAN AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

The Society, founded in 1850, was an active organization for about seven years, encouraging agriculture and taking part in the initial efforts to import agricultural laborers into the Kingdom. After 1857, the organization became more a botanical acclimatization society, introducing exotic plants into Hawaii and maintaining a garden and caretaker. In 1867, the Society was incorporated but dissolved in September 1869 by common consent of its members. Its charter was surrendered and its property and liabilities were turned over to the Hawaiian government.

In 1882, a second Royal Hawaiian Agricultural Society was organized which continued until amalgamated with the Planters' Labor and Supply Association into the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association.

RUGGLES AND COMPANY  
(1854 – 1856)

Ruggles, Eli Samuel (1826 – 1862):

- 1826 Born December 18 in Honolulu; son of Samuel and Nancy (Wells) Ruggles, members of First Company of missionaries
- 1834 Returned to U.S. with his parents
- 1849 Returned to Honolulu
- 1854 March 10, formed partnership with Asa G. Thurston under name of Ruggles & Company; bought out Benjamin F. Hardy, retail druggist and continued his business of drugs and pharmaceuticals
- 1856 February 13, company and partnership dissolved by sale of company's stock when a suit was brought against them for non-payment of promissory notes
- 1859 May 2, Eli Samuel Ruggles left Honolulu on S. S. Pizarro, bound for Bremen and Liverpool  
Studied medicine for two years in Paris; obtained diploma from Royal College of Surgeons in Edinburgh
- 1861 November, returned to U.S.  
Appointed an Assistant Surgeon in Army Medical Corps
- 1862 January (?) advanced to Surgeon, Army Medical Corps  
Died February 16, Seminary Hospital, Georgetown, D.C.
