**UNION IRON WORKS
(1890 – 1892)**

Incorporated March 1890 as a foundry and machine shop. Rapid expansion of company required debts and mortgages, resulting in the company passing into receivership in January 1892.

UNITED VETERANS' SERVICE COUNCIL RECORDS

The United Veterans' Service Council was an organization sponsored and supported by the Spanish War Veterans, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion and their respective Auxiliaries. It was organized and equipped to assist veterans of all wars in their contacts with the government as well as in other matters of their general welfare. The council was instrumental in aiding many veterans in securing employment. This organization was active in Hawaii from 1934 until about 1949. Records of deceased veterans of the Civil, Spanish-American Wars and World War I were received as a gift from the United Veterans Service Council in May 1950.

SERIES DESCRIPTION

Deceased Veteran Records. ca.1933-1949. 2 linear ft. (2-12 in. boxes)
 Arranged alphabetically by name.

Card file of deceased veterans who served in the Civil, Spanish-American, and World War I. Gives name, date of death, name and location of cemetery plot. Some records also list rank, enlistment and discharge date, birth date, next of kin and cause of death. Hawaiians during the Civil War were often assigned to U.S. Colored Troop regiments. Information on the World War I veterans were possibly extracted from the Grave Registration Form No. 1, required to be sent to the American Legion following burial of every World War veteran.

 Arranged in two sub-series and thereunder alphabetically by name.

Carbon copies of applications made by Hawaii veterans to the Regional Office or Veterans Administration Facility for adjusted-service compensation through the United Veterans Service Council. Starting June 15, 1936, the Bonus Bill passed by the U.S. Congress, provided for payment of the face value of adjusted service certificates in \$50 government bonds.

The application gives adjusted service certificate number, date, amount, service number, name, place of birth, date of birth,

serial number, date of enlistment, date of discharge, rank and organization at date of discharge, address and finger prints.
