To be successful, we are cognizant of the fact that we cannot do it alone. Our employees are the key to our success.




# Emergency Repair Work Completed on Holiday

Just because the week ends doesn't mean the work ends, and emergencies don't take holidays!

On the neighbor islands, the DAGS District Offices provide repair and maintenance services for the public schools and provide assistance in times of need. The President's Day holiday was no exception.

On Sunday afternoon preceding the President's Day holiday, DAGS Kauai District Office received a call from Kauai High School about a waterline leak that was discovered on campus. Both school and DAGS staff responded to the call but, despite their best efforts, the leak could not be isolated, so water service to the entire school had to be shut off to prevent the continued loss of water.

The problem is that, if a campus has no water, the school needs to be cancelled for health and safety reasons, so it was critical to repair the line as soon as possible.

Thankfully a local contractor, Cushnie Construction, was avail-



able with a crew the next day to perform the emergency repair. The Kauai Department of Water was also available and willing to loan the contractor the parts needed to expeditiously complete the repairs.

It was found that a large root from a nearby monkeypod tree sandwiched

itself between a concrete jacket and a six inch cast iron waterline, causing the line to crack and leak onto the driveway above. The root had to be removed and it proved to be a formidable adversary, as it was so dense it took a combination of three

saws (a Sawzall, a circular saw, and even a chainsaw), a mud gun, and sheer will and determination to remove it. Once the root was gone, the actual repair work on the line could begin, and the repair was completed just as a torrential downpour began.

Thanks to the combined efforts of the contractor, school, and DAGS personnel, and the generosity of the Department of Water in lending the needed parts, water service was restored in time for school to open the next day.

# Building Civic Engagement and Lifelong Voters

It's reported that turnout among young voters has been on the rise across the nation. In fact, during the 2022 Elections, turnout among voters under 30 was the second highest that it's been in the past three decades.

**Why is this important?** Participation by any group of eligible voters is surely something to celebrate! But we at the Office of Elections are especially excited to hear that the youth vote is increasing as we believe this to have a great impact on the overall health of our democratic process.

When citizens are civically engaged early in life, it is more likely that they'll have built a habit around voting and remain engaged in the future!

**How can we grow youth participation?** One of the most powerful ways we can encourage this early engagement is by getting Hawaii's young people registered to vote. Voter pre-registration is just the tool for that.

## What is Voter Pre-Registration?

It's simple! To pre-register means that you have registered to vote ahead of turning 18. If you are at least 16 years old, a U.S. citizen, and a resident of Hawaii, you are eligible to pre-register.

Those who have pre-registered don't have to do anything further. As soon as they turn 18, they will automatically receive their ballot in the mail for every election.

**Fun fact!** Hawaii is 1 of 15 states and Washington, D.C. to allow teens 16+ to register to vote.

## Hawaii's Annual Young Voter Registration Program

Each year, our office invites all public, charter, and private high schools statewide to participate in our Young Voter Registration Program (YVRP). We distribute thousands of voter registration applications to the participating schools and work with school liaisons to help students complete and submit the application. We also provide voter education materials addressing questions they may have about the voting process.

We recently wrapped this year's program, which ran from September 2022 through January 2023. Seventeen schools participated, giving thousands of Hawaii students the opportunity to register to vote conveniently from their classrooms.

First, let's make sure that your voter registration is in order by using the online voter registration system at [elections.hawaii.gov](https://elections.hawaii.gov). If your information is current, you're all set!

Next, if anyone in your household is 16+, encourage them to register to vote today.

# State Procurement Office Shares Its Initiatives

**Procurement Consolidation Working, [Act 282, SLH 2022](#)**, established a working group to develop a plan for the phased-in consolidation of procurement services and staff within executive branch agencies within a five-year timespan and requires the working group to make recommendations for attracting high-quality procurement professionals to the State. An interim report was submitted to the Legislature in December 2022. Moving forward, the SPO will be conducting monthly meetings with department stakeholders to decide on a business model for the consolidation.

**Past Performance Database, [Act 188, SL 2021](#)**, requires the SPO to establish and administer a past performance database and adopt rules by December 2023. The online database and vendor assessment questionnaire have a targeted launch date of May 2023, which allows a few months to work out any glitches and provide training to government entities before the deadline.

**Small Business Initiative, [Act 168, SLH 2022](#)**, established a five-year small business initiative to assist small businesses, particularly Native Hawaiian owned, women-owned, and veteran-owned to contract with government entities. The bill appropriated funds for a small business coordinator in the SPO, plus procure the services of a contractor to provide outreach services. The SPO is currently negotiating with a vendor for the services.

**eProcurement Automation System.** The SPO has selected a contractor to develop an eMarketPlace and eProcurement system. The contract is in the process and we expect to start development in May 2023.

**SPO Fun Fact:** Seven of the SPO staff speak languages other than English are available to provide assistance to Limited English Proficient persons. Languages represented in the SPO are as follows: Japanese, Cantonese, Ilokano, Tagalog, Thai, German, and Swedish. One SPO staffer is tri-lingual!

## *Filipino Veterans of WWII Memorial Dedicated at Waipahu Public Library*



A dedication ceremony was held on Friday, February 24, 2023 for the “Filipino Veterans of WWII Monument” at the Waipahu Public Library. This is a commissioned work of art project set in motion by the 2017 Hawai‘i State Legislature through HB 942, Relating to Filipino veterans, appropriating funds for the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts to commission a permanent monument to show Hawai‘i’s gratitude to Filipino veterans, provide a visual reminder of these Filipino veterans’ unique place in American and global history, and to educate the public on the role that minorities played in the outcome of World War II.

The event which was held in-person for the first time since 2020, was hosted by **Ben Gutierrez** and featured an appearance by **Brandy Nālani McDougall**, the current Hawai‘i State Poet Laureate. Guest judges included **Laurel Nakanishi**, **Dr. Maya Soetoro-Ng**, **Mark Branner**, and **Sean-Joseph Choo**.

Irene will advance to the Poetry Out Loud National Semi-Finals in Washington, DC. All 55 state and jurisdictional champions will compete in the national semifinals on Tuesday, May 9, from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. ET, with the top nine students advancing to the finals on Wednesday, May 10, from 7:00 to 9:15 p.m. ET. Both days are free and open to the public and will be available through a one-time-only webcast at [arts.gov](https://arts.gov).

## *Bishop Museum & ‘Iolani Palace to Receive \$19,500,000*

**Governor Josh Green** authorized \$17,500,000 for Bishop Museum and \$2,000,000 for the Friends of Iolani Palace through the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts. The funding was a legislative line item in the SFCA’s 2022 fiscal budget but was not released during the previous administration. SFCA leadership and staff have been working with the two institutions and the two administrations since July of 2022 on the release of the funding. The funding will support the two institutions operations and construction projects.

# RECIPE ROW

*The AMD staff looks forward to building new relationships and continued partnerships with everyone. With new staff comes new ideas and suggestions. We would like to share a favorite recipe from one of the AMD staff members called "Lemon Grass Chicken." Hope you enjoy this recipe!*

## Lemon Grass Chicken

1 whole chicken  
1 bunch of lemon grass  
1 small onion  
1 green onion  
Vegan oyster flavored sauce  
Salt and pepper  
2 T. butter

### Instructions

Pat dry whole chicken  
Place soft butter underneath chicken skin  
Season chicken with salt and pepper  
Rub vegan sauce all over chicken skin and in cavity  
Stuff cavity with lemon grass and onion  
Place chicken in roasting pan and cover with foil.  
Refrigerate at least 24 hours  
Preheat oven to 325F.  
Add about ¼ cup of water to roasting pan to make a sauce for basting.  
Place covered roasting pan with chicken on the center rack of oven.  
Baste chicken periodically until internal temperature reaches 165F.

## Butter Yaki

2 lbs. tender beef, thinly sliced (e.g., shabu shabu beef thickness)  
1 block butter  
2 lbs. vegetables (watercress, won bok, mushrooms, bean sprouts)

### Sauce

1 c. shoyu  
1/2 c. daikon, grated  
1/4 c. mirin  
1/4 c. sugar

### Instructions

Heat shoyu, sugar, and mirin together. Cool and serve in individual sauce dishes. Fry meat and vegetables in butter using electric skillet at dinner table. Add grated daikon before dipping meat and vegetables in the sauce.
